US House = 435 members, 2 yrs terms
NH has 2 Representatives (2 districts)
Repub = 212, Dems = 222 (1 vacancy, in VA)

Leaders: Speaker : Kevin McCarthy (R) Majority leader: Steve Scalise (R) Minority leader: Hakeem Jeffries (D)

US Senate = 100 members, 6 yrs terms (next seat up in NH is Jeanne Shaheen's, Nov. 2026) Republicans = 49, Democrats = 51

Senate President is VP Kamala Harris (votes in tie only)

President Pro Tem: Patty Murray (D) Majority leader: Chuck Schumer (D) Minority leader: Mitch McConnell (R)

Judicial branch:

Judges are appointed by President; approved by the Senate

Budget—1 year; appropriations must be voted on, but Congress can pass a "continuing resolution" to fund govt. until a budget is passed

Budget—2 years; must balance (Budget will be adopted late Spring 2023)

County government—10 counties. 3 elected commissioners in each. State reps also serve as county delegation. (local property taxes fund county needs)

Diversity in the 118th Congress (2023-2024)

In the 2022 Congressional elections, 7 new members were elected to the Senate and 24 new members were elected to the House.

The House and Senate female representation:

The House has 124 women, comprising 28.5 % of the chamber's voting members.

The Senate has 25 women, (one more than the 2021-22 Senate).

The 118th Congress has the largest number of ethnically diverse members, making up 28 percent of Congress.

US House of Representatives: 124 women will be taking office in January 2023. More than half of the incoming class of 22 freshman women in the House will be women of color, showing the increasing diversity of that chamber. [CNN, Nov. 2022]

New Hampshire election statistics:

As of Nov. 20, 2022: 925,401 people were registered to vote:

Democrats = 289,590; Republicans = 284,705; "undeclared" voters = 351,106

In November 2022 election: 814,499 ballots were cast, a record turnout of 70% for a mid-term election.

The Executive Council has 4 Republican and 1 Democrat members again this term.

The 2023-24 NH Senate has an equal number of male and female senators.

In the NH House 246 of its members are male; 148 are female.

The youngest state representative this session is 18 years old.

The longest-serving state representative is serving her 22nd term.

Other interesting statistics:

Total population of NH (2020 census) is 1,377,529 (increase of 4.6% since 2010)

Population is 93% white.

State has 2nd or 3rd oldest population in the country, depending on reports. Median age is over 43. Nearly 18% of NH's population is over 65.

In 2010 NH had the highest median income in the nation.

By 2019 NH had the 8th highest median household income (almost \$78,000 per yr)

36% of NH residents over 25 years old have a bachelor's degree or higher.
